<p>Feedback is collected for all the departments in order to improve the teaching learning process, student feedback system enable the faculty member to improve the performance on an on-going basis. Feedback collection process: The institute believes that to prepare students with holistic skills, it is important to equip faculty with in-depth course knowledge, delivery skills and an understanding of student psychology. To ensure that the teaching methodologies adopted are in sync with the student and other stakeholder expectations, the institute follows a feedback mechanism as outlined below: • The feedback forms are available online. Student can login with their register number and fill the form. • The feedback collection process happens once in a semester. Feedback analysis process: • Performance of the teaching faculty will be analyzed by Principal / HoD's of respective departments based on the parameters mentioned in the feedback form. • All the comments written by the students in the feedback forms will be communicated to the respective faculty members along with their feedback levels to self-assess their strengths and weaknesses and to enhance their teaching skills. Corrective measures: Faculty whose feedback falls below 75 is mentored by HoD and members in the department. An orientation program will also be arranged for faculty with performance rating less than 75.</p>

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Vignan has evolved a time tested mechanism through the years as an important activity to operate and to look after the overall well-being of the students of Vignan's Institute of Information Technology. Every faculty member is attached to 20 students for a semester or even a year. In the first two months, a counsellor meets the allotted students at least two or three times a week and observes individual student attitude, behavior, conduct and also in the group studies and maintains the profile of every student which includes the academic, economic, social, family background etc They inform the students about basic aspects like importance of regularity, dress code, language they have to use, inter personal relationships, group dynamics and also speak to individual students personally. After 1 or 2 months of this close observation and counseling, the counselor classifies them into three or four groups depending on criteria such as their performance in academics, any behavioral issues etc., After thorough understanding of every students personality, the counselor appreciates and encourages the advanced learners and helps them set higher goals. He or she renders moral support to average learners with insignificant behavioral problems and mentors them to improve the performance. If necessary, other senior colleagues and parents are involved to resolve these issues. Counseling is a continuous process at VIIT for all the 4 years of study helping them throughout in sorting out any issues and giving their optimum performance. This mechanism is followed by every counselor scrupulously which has yielded in resolving 90 issues.
